# From the Headmaster

QEH is an exciting and busy place at the moment. We eagerly await the opening of our new Sixth Form Centre which should be completed in the Autumn term, and plans for the Junior School are rapidly gathering pace.

In these pages you will also read of our expeditions and trips, sporting achievements and, of course, our outstanding public examination results. I am delighted too by the way in which our development programme is progressing through the support of Old Boys and other friends of the school.

I hope you enjoy this edition of QEH News and I congratulate all those involved in the many successes featured here.

# Best-ever Results!

QEH has announced record A Level results in 2006. A best-ever 90 per cent of passes were at A or B grade – well ahead of the previous record of 83 per cent. Twenty-seven candidates at the school achieved straight A grades.

In addition, 10 of the 73 QEH candidates achieved grades to enable them to take places at Oxford or Cambridge Universities.

At GCSE boys also gained excellent results. Some 98% of grades were at A-C, with a cumulative total of 58% at A\* or A grade.

Stephen Holliday, Headmaster, commented: "It's great to be able to announce record results this year and all the pupils are to be congratulated on their hard work and the success they have achieved.

"With these results, a new Sixth Form Centre opening shortly and work starting soon on a new Junior School, there has never been a better time to be a pupil at QEH."



## Stephen Corbin

The sudden death of Steve Corbin on May 10th shocked the school community.

Steve left QEH in 2002 and, during his gap year, spent six months in Peru with Christian charity Latin Link before going up to Churchill College, Cambridge to read Modern Languages.

He returned to Peru with Latin Link, during his year abroad from university, and it was there that he had a tragic accident retrieving a football while playing with friends.

Steve was a highly talented young man and a person with a deep personal faith. He touched the lives of many people, and at his funeral we heard how he had

shared his faith with the street children in Lima and worked selflessly to help them. Our thoughts and prayers are with Steve's family and we pray that the strength of his Christian witness may be an inspiration to others.

## Debating and Public Speaking

In May the Public Speaking Team competed in the National Final of the ESU Competition at Westminster School. Tom Pye, speaking on *The State Should Fund Political Parties*, was voted the outstanding Personality of the Final. This is the fifth time in six years that a QEH team has featured in this National Final.

In June two teams represented QEH at Newstead Wood School in Kent and achieved creditable 5th and 7th places out of 20 teams.

At the end of the Summer Year 10 went to Badminton School for a series of Debating workshops. The theme was 'Climate Change' ending with a debate on: *This House believes that the US was right not to ratify the Kyoto Protocol.*

In June intrepid Year 9 boys tried to persuade Redland High School students to vote against the proposal: *This House Would Educate Boys and Girls Together* and – perhaps unsurprisingly – failed to convince them.



## Himalayan Expedition

A party of 24 pupils and staff has just returned, with team leader Mr Stephen Cook, from a gruelling but exhilarating 20-day expedition trekking in the full majesty of the Himalayan mountain range via Northern India, through Ladakh, 3500 metres above sea level.

Five days were spent acclimatising to the altitude and visiting local monasteries and palaces. A highlight was a trip to the highest motorable pass in the world at Khamdung La (18,380 feet), after a hair-raising journey along narrow mountain roads in blizzard conditions.

A day's white-water rafting was followed by an 8-day trek from the ancient monastery at Lamayuru during which they passed across two mountain passes, each about 5000 metres high. The expedition was a huge success and thoroughly enjoyed by all.



## Ten Tors

Three teams successfully completed the 35, 45 and 55 mile routes in this year's Ten Tors event on Dartmoor.

In addition to the Ten Tors and the Himalayas expeditions, over 120 boys are involved in the D of E Award Scheme, many gaining Gold standard.

We are grateful to the Friends of QEH who have generously supported outdoor pursuits, providing lots of tents and other essential kit to the tune of £2250.



## Avon Schools Orienteering

A number of boys were very successful in the individual championships of the Avon Schools Orienteering Association in May. This is the first year that QEH has participated.

## Wonders of Greece

Over Easter, 62 students and six staff embarked for Athens to discover the wonders of ancient Greece.

The schedule included marvelling at the Parthenon, running the Olympic track, Pnyx Hill (where true democracy originated), the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the impressive mountain-side ruins of Delphi, Mycenae, the Corinth Canal, the theatres of Dionysus and Epidaurus where QEH boys performed Sophocles' *Oedipus the King*.

The QEH golf team has had an excellent season with Tom Fletcher, Nick Lee, Dan Lewis and Simon Fox coming away as 'Handicap Winners' in the Avon Schools Golf Championships at the Players' Club in April.

## Under 13s - Reckoning on a Record for all-Rounders



After an incredible season on the rugby field, the Under 13s have kept up the momentum on the cricket square, ending up in the Final of the Avon Schools Championship in September.

In beating Wells Cathedral School handsomely in May, QEH Under 13s rattled up a score of 211 without loss in their allotted 30 overs.

### Fencing Champion – one in a thousand

He won the overall 'Master of Arms' made up of Foil, Epee and Sabre, beating the number 1 seed in the Epee. In the individual weapons he came 1st in the Epee Competition, 11th in the Sabre and 12th in the Foil.



### Mark Regan goes that extra mile

In June 550 QEH boys and staff were joined by sports personality and Bristol, England and British Lion hooker, Mark Regan. They raised £5,000 for *Sport Relief* by running a mile around the School Yard. Other sports personalities were 'Sid' Lawrence (Glos. and England), Geoff Dunford (Chairman, Bristol Rovers FC) and Keith Millen (Assistant Manager, Bristol City FC).



### Sunshine and Records

The sun came out and records were broken in this year's Sports Day at Failand.

Notable successes were: Adam Taylor who broke the U15 100m and 200m records; Sam Bedwell who broke the U12 800m and 1500m records and Ezra Davies who broke the U12 discus record.

## Raising Funds for Diabetes & Other Charities

The boys have been very busy raising money for Charity. Apart from efforts for events such as SportRelief and Boarders' Football, reported elsewhere, the work for Diabetes Research was especially notable. Money was raised both through the Unplugged Concert and Mufti Day. The Foundation explained their work in Assembly and the cheque for £570 was presented.

We have two Mufti Days each term and alongside this work the boys have run, jumped, swum, played and generally enjoyed themselves, and in excess of £6,000 has been raised in the process. We have built good links with the Gambia which continues to receive our surplus textbooks.

From September a new committee, launched by the boys, will oversee our charitable work. They will ensure that we focus on charities close to the interests of the boys and that we maximise our fundraising potential.



### Friends Summer Ball

The Friends of QEH held a very successful Summer Ball at School in July with Buffet Dinner and Live Band.

This was one of a number of fundraising events organised by The Friends who have generously raised over £4400 for the School this year. The second-hand clothing shop raised £2500 and the raffle on Sports Day raised £600. Boys and staff at the school appreciate the generosity of this hard-working group of parents.



### Football Club Dinner

Guests of Honour at the QEH AFC annual dinner were Steve Lansdown, Chairman of Bristol City FC, and his wife Maggie. Over 60 people attended including staff, pupils and parents.

Presentations were made to 'Players of the Year' with the coveted and newly created Golden Boot Award going to Tom Parsons (pictured below), super striker, who had terrorised defences across the West Country on his way to a haul of 24 goals.



### Boarders' Charity Football

The 14th annual charity football match took place at Failand in May. A mix of staff and guests took on a boarding team which contained boarding staff past and present and Jon Lansdown, a star of the 1st XI in 2001.

As a result the game saw the first ever win for the boarders: 7-2, with goals from both Mr Paul Joslin and SPR! £200 was raised for Meningitis UK.

## Samuel Gist

One of the school's lesser known historic benefactors is Samuel Gist.

When researching the history of the school, in preparation for the publication of the brochure, I noted that his Will dated 1808 left money for assistance to boys from the proceeds of his fortune from his plantations in Virginia. This prompted me to research further and it appears that Samuel was a quite remarkable individual. An orphan boarder he was apprenticed

to a plantation owner in Virginia where he did well and also gained the attention and affection of the plantation owner's wife.

When the owner died he married the widow and amassed a huge fortune.

He was a friend of George Washington and subsequently got involved in the American War of Independence and, as a true Bristolian, decided to return to England to sit it out.

He returned to his career and lived into his 100th year. In his Will not only did he leave money to QEHL but he also freed all his several hundred slaves.

He offered them transport back to Africa or to one of the "free" states and the majority opted to go to Ohio. A whole community of their descendants thrives there to this day and we are currently trying to make contact with them.

Clearly a quite remarkable QEHL boy, an inspiration to us all.

If anyone has any information on him I would be very pleased to hear it.
