Entrance Assessments

- 1 First, you will need to complete an Application Form to sit the Entrance Assessments
- 2 Boys are then invited to come to the School for a morning and complete Assessments in Numeracy, Creative Writing, Reading and Verbal Reasoning. The dates for these are shown below
- 3 Don't worry, because the Assessments are informal and your son will be relaxed and enjoy the morning
- 4 There follows an interview with the Headmaster and your son then meets other teachers and boys
- 5 Once you have received your successful Assessment results you will need to formally accept your place.

There are two main points of Entry

Year 3

Year 3 (7-plus) take their Entrance Assessments in the week commencing **14 November 2011** for entry in September 2012

Year 5

Year 5 (9-plus) take their Entrance Assessments in the week commencing **21 November 2011** for entry in September 2012

QEH Junior School (Years 3-6)

School Hours

To accommodate parents' working hours, the School is open from 8.00am to 6.00pm. The School day begins at 8.45am and finishes at 3.50pm for Years 3 and 4, and 4.00pm for Years 5 and 6.

Break time There are short breaks mid-morning and mid-afternoon.

Lunch time The boys have a one hour break for lunch. Lunch time is well supervised by teaching staff and teaching assistants.

After-school care runs from the end of School until 6.00pm. There is no extra charge for after-school care up to 5.00pm, after which there is a small charge. There is no charge for before-school care.



Uniform

This can be purchased from our sole supplier Ikon: www.ikonschools.com or via the link on the QEH website. There is also a second hand clothing shop run by The Friends of QEH.

The basic uniform consists of white shirt, dark grey trousers, dark blue blazer, School tie and black shoes of conventional pattern.

Curriculum

The curriculum is active, practical and participatory, aimed at the learning needs of boys. Literacy and numeracy lessons are daily though supplemented by regular science lessons, creative and performing arts and topic work. Topic work is designed to incorporate work on history, geography, RE and ICT, as well as integrating this with numeracy, literacy, art and music. Topics include: Pirates, The Vikings, The Victorians, The Greeks, World War Two, The Rain Forest, The Universe, and others.

The reading schemes used are designed specifically for boys, as is the collection of books in the library.

The School has a homework policy. Boys can expect to receive weekly homework in numeracy, literacy and science, as well as nightly reading. They may occasionally be asked to complete some topic work as well.

Pastoral Care

Busy parents can have the peace of mind that their son is well cared for before, during and after the School day.

Effective communication with parents is a high priority. A positive and valued home-school partnership helps to create an important structure to support a boy in his learning. Regular sharing of information about a boy's progress enables targets to be set, to build on prior achievements. Parents are encouraged to be involved with their son's homework.

We promote a spirit of curiosity and a love of learning. Each boy's needs are catered for in an individual way so that he can achieve his utmost potential.

Important skills, such as decision-making are taught from an early age.

We generate the development of personal qualities of good manners, reliability, punctuality, caring for others and a sense of humour!

Sport

There is a wide range of sports available, many taking place at QEH Sports Ground at Failand, only a ten-minute coach ride away. We share our outstanding football facilities with Bristol City Football Academy and through the games programme boys get expert coaching in rugby, football, cricket, athletics and tennis. They can expect to have at least two sessions a week. In team sports, every boy gets the chance to play in at least one School match per term.

The after-school clubs include further opportunities for coaching in a variety of sports, and there are weekly lessons in PE and swimming.

They organise some outstanding social events which are enormously popular and great fun, giving parents, boys and teachers the opportunity to get together and socialise informally.

There are three main points of Entry though places in other Years occasionally become available.

At Year 7 (11-plus)

Candidates must complete an 11-plus application form to sit the Entrance Examinations. Papers are in Verbal and Non-Verbal Reasoning with additional Mathematics and English papers. There is also an interview. (Please note: Entry at 11-plus is also open to exceptionally able pupils who are younger (10-plus) if it is felt that they are able to work with older pupils throughout their secondary education).

**Entrance Examinations for Year 7:
Saturday 21 and 28 January 2012
for entry the following September.***

At Year 9 (13-plus)

Candidates must complete a 13-plus application form to sit the Entrance Examinations. Papers are in Verbal Reasoning, Mathematics and English. The candidate's current school is asked to provide a full report. There is also an interview.

**Entrance Examinations for Year 9:
Saturday 28 January 2012 for entry
the following September.**

Sixth Form

Candidates must complete a Sixth Form application form. Entry is subject to good overall GCSE results (typically 6 B grades for pupils already at the School), particularly in the subject in which the pupil hopes to specialise at A-level, and a statement of good character and conduct from the boy's present Head.

Scholarships of up to 25% of fees are offered to the top performers at Year 7 and Year 9. Awards are also made at Sixth Form level.

Bursaries are available giving up to 100% assistance towards fees (see *Financial Information on page 9*).

Special Educational Needs

Those with Special Educational Needs must submit an up-to-date report from a certified Educational Psychologist before the examination. Extra time may be allowed in the examination in consultation with the Head of Learning Support, and on the basis of the report. It is also important that we are informed, **before** the examination, of any other circumstances which might necessitate extra time in the examination or special arrangements if your son joins the School. The granting of extra time is at the discretion of the School.

QEH Senior School (Years 7-13)

School Hours

The normal School hours are 8:35am to 4:00pm daily, Monday to Friday. Boys may stay on after School. Boys chosen for School games' fixtures are frequently required on Saturday.

Uniform

The curriculum at QEH is constantly under review and changes from this outline are possible in the future. The present situation is outlined below:

Year 9

The core curriculum contains mathematics, English, library skills, physics, chemistry, biology, geography, history, religious studies, PSHE and physical education. Five other subjects are chosen from French, German, Spanish, Latin, Greek, art, drama, DT, ICT and music. At least one modern foreign language must be chosen.

The GCSE Years

In Years 10 and 11 the core curriculum contains: English (Language and Literature), Mathematics, PSHE (not examined).

Seven more GCSE subjects are chosen (in consultation with parents) from:

The timetable is constructed to give as many boys as possible their first choices. Unless there are good reasons, all boys take ten GCSE subjects as a minimum. At least two sciences and one modern foreign language must be chosen.

Sets and Class Sizes

Mathematics and French are setted according to ability from Year 7. English is set from Year 10. Class sizes in Years 7 and 8 vary between 22 and 25, with some subjects being taught in half-classes. A typical Year 9 class numbers 18 to 24 whilst GCSE groups vary considerably, around an average size of 18.

The Sixth Form

The priority in the Sixth Form timetable is to give as much freedom in choice of subjects as is possible. In the Sixth Form our set sizes average about 8, with a range from 1 to 15.

In the Lower Sixth four AS subjects are chosen from the following:

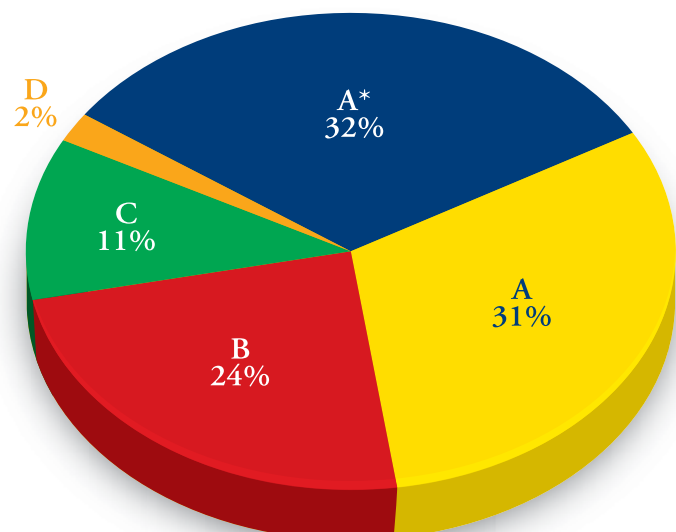

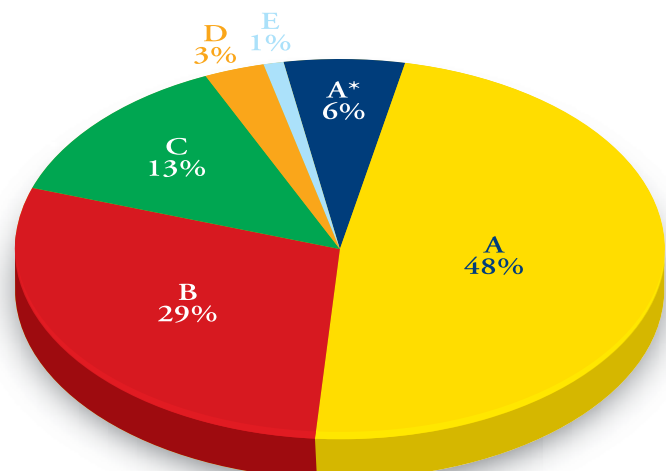

Financial Information

Fees

From September 2011, until further notice, the fees will be:

Registration fee for Entrance Examinations

(both schools) £30 (non refundable)

Acceptance deposit

(both schools) £350 (refundable in final term's fee account)

Junior School

Tuition fee £7,359 per year (payable at the start of each term in three instalments of £2,453) including before- and after-school supervision until 5:00pm (between 5:00pm and 6:00pm there is a fixed charge of £5:00 which includes light refreshments).

Junior fees also include educational trips and week-day, term-time parking provision in the nearby multi-storey car park for a short period both morning and afternoon for the convenience of drop off and collection.

Lunch charge £2.75 per day (termly in advance)



Senior School

Tuition fee £11,259 per year (payable at the start of each term in three instalments of £3,753) including compulsory Accident Insurance, textbooks and essential educational trips. Excludes public examination charges.

Lunch charge £3.00 per day (termly in advance)

Breakfast charge £1.50 (payable daily on a cash basis). Available between 7:40am and 8:20am

There is a sibling discount of 5% for a second or subsequent brother whilst the older brother is still at QEH.

Bursaries & Scholarships

(Also see our Bursaries & Scholarships booklet)

Bursaries

Bursaries are means-tested and a boy can receive up to 100% assistance towards fees depending on parental income and assets. (A separate application for assistance should be completed before the examinations).

Academic Scholarships

John Carr Academic Scholarships of up to 25% of fees are awarded on the basis of a boy's performance in the 11+ Entrance Examinations. Scholarships are awarded in a similar way at 13+.

Music Scholarships

Music Scholarships are awarded to able musicians at both 11+ and 13+ who show all-round musical talent and potential (not just grades achieved). A Music Scholar must also sit and pass the normal Entrance Examinations.

Ogden Sixth Form Science Scholarships

Two Sixth Form Science bursaries, worth up to 100% of fees, are available to applicants from state schools for entry into Year 12. These bursaries are means tested and students must expect to achieve high grades at GCSE, and be intending to apply to study Physics/Mathematics at A-level with a view to reading a physics-related degree at university. QEH Gifted and Talented Programme

All John Carr Scholars will be recognized under the School's 'Gifted & Talented' programme (see separate booklet).

How to apply for a Scholarship or Bursary

Every candidate who sits the Entrance Examinations is automatically entered for a John Carr Academic Scholarship. There is nothing additional to do.

For a Music Scholarship, please tick the box on the application form and the Director of Music will contact you to discuss the audition.

If you wish to apply for a Bursary you must complete the *Statement of Financial Circumstances* form before your son sits the Entrance Examinations and tick the box to indicate that you are applying for an Assisted Place. If your son's performance in the examinations warrants consideration for a Bursary, you will be invited to School to discuss how we might be able to help.

Confirmation of accepting a place

Parents of successful candidates will need to confirm their son's place and enter a formal agreement with the School.

Where to find QEH



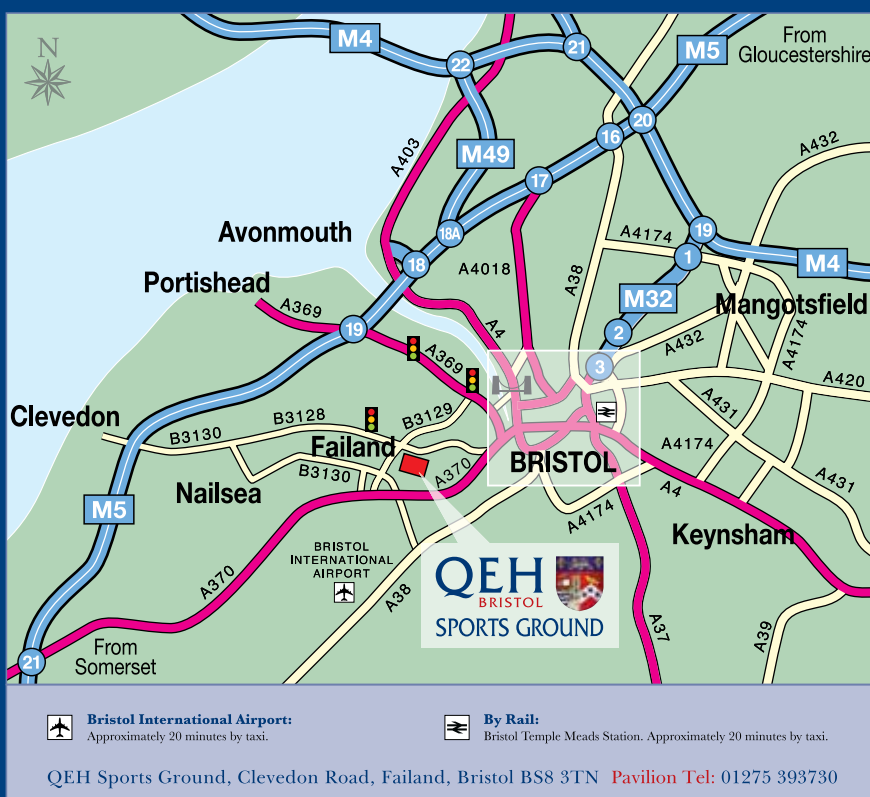
Location & Directions: Bristol Centre & QEH

By road: Follow signs to Clifton, where you will find QEH.

QEH is easily accessible from both the M4 and M5 motorways.

By train: Railway stations are at Bristol Parkway (not marked) or Temple Meads.

From Temple Meads it is possible to catch the No. 8 or No. 9 bus to Clifton Triangle (about 20 minutes) from the stop at the approach ramp to the station. Alternatively, it is possible to take the No. 1 bus from outside 'The Reckless Engineer' public house across the road from the station entrance.



QEH Sports Ground

From outside Bristol - use M5 Motorway to Jct. 19 - then follow the A369 towards Bristol for approx 4km to B3129 Beggar Bush Lane. Turn right and follow road for 3km to traffic lights. Turn left and Sports Ground is 200m ahead on the right hand side - opposite the "Optimists" Cricket Ground.

From Bristol - use A370 Weston-super-Mare road and leave via B3125 signed to Failand and Clevedon. The Sports Ground is 3km ahead on the left hand side, past the Long Ashton Golf Course.
